# Interviewing the School Captain -An Interview Transcript



**Deputy Literary Secretary**: You have been in Global Edge for the past seven to eight years. Who all have inspired you to become a leader?

**Ishan:** If we talk about the world right now, it is all AI. People have a compulsion to go to the AI field, because AI is going to be everything in a few years. I don't really believe in doing something you don't like. So, I believe that if you have a job, you should be self-motivated rather than compelled to have that job. That is my entire purpose towards life, the way I look at life.

**Deputy Literary Secretary**: Is there any message you would like to give to the future school captains of Global Edge?

**Ishan**: The message I would give to future leaders is very simple. Rather than looking too far ahead into the future, look at what's happening around you, look at what's happening now. And you will find so much more that you can do, than you can think of doing later on.

And last but not at all least, the TIGERS!




